### BEST GERMANS LEAVING GER-MANY

An exchange journal has the following: "As a result of the war a remarkable number of Germans are leaving Germany. For many years prior to 1914 the death rate far exceeded the birth rate in the most densely populated areas. Now the death rate is in excess of the birth rate and the social and moral tone of the people is decidedly lowered. France at its present rate will in a few years contain no more than a few million people, and Germany, once so prolific, for while there are many births in the latter country, the infant mortality rate, owing to unfortunate conditions caused by the war, is frightfully high, and the moral and physical tone of the people is unfavorable. In addition to this, thousands of the better classes are leaving the country or are making preparations to do so. Within the last few years about a thousand have gone to Mexico, large numbers have gone to Brazil, and to other South American countries. Our country alone has received a large number of Germans, but it is hard on Germany."

### STUDENTS LEARN EXTRA-VAGANCE

The fact that recently a candidate elected to a Rhodes scholarship, declining the honor, is a fair illustration of the inadequate allowance of \$1,500 a year, provided by Mr. Cecil Rhodes's will, has suggested a proposal of increasing the amount. It cannot be done, however, in accordance with the unchangeable provision of the will. That amount would carry for two students a generation ago, but that is the present-day situation. The average student of today spends more, heedlessly than his father or grandfather did, on college. Automobiles, taxis, dinners, dances, clothes, athletics, and so forth, pile up the total rapidly. ### The Public Health

CITIZENS ARE REQUESTED TO COMPLY WITH THE PUBLIC HEALTH ACT. Notice is hereby given that all residents of Acton are required forthwith to clean their cellars, drains, yards, privies, water closets, outhouses, and other premises, and remove therefrom any refuse, manure and other substances which may endanger the public health and to have the same completed by the sanitary inspector on the day which day the sanitary inspector will further take notice. The Public Health Act prohibiting the keeping of horse manure in the streets on or after the 15th of November, existing in part at least 70 feet from any street, and at least 40 feet from any street or lane, with floors kept clear from all manure and regularly cleaned, will be strictly enforced.
