John G. McNaughton, of Burlington,
V. J. L. Littler, of Milton, G. C. McKay,

ction in 1908, 1911, 1914, he was re-
elected.

For several years Dr. Nixon sat in
the Legislature of Ontario. In 1903-4
he was Reeve. While Reeve he first con-
tested the riding in provincial politics.

In the general election of 1903 he was
defeated, but was re-elected in 1905.

He was succeeded in the House by
Dr. E. C. Drury, Prime Minister.

Alfred Wenzel Nixon, M. D. C. M.,
of Guelph, was elected to the House
of Commons in 1904. He was a
Irish and Scotch peerage. He was the son
of Edward Nixon, one of the
most prominent men of his district. He was
educated at Brampton High School, and
then at University. Two years ago he
was married Miss Rosalie Barber, of
Georgetown. His wife was spent
in his native country of Ireland.


