Halton's Official Referendum Maj. Is Given as 3,044

Every Municipality in the County Gives Substantial "Dry" Majority.

2500 FEWER VOTES WERE POLLED THAN IN 1919.

Returning Officer, McCready held the official count of the ballots cast in the Referendum vote on April 18, last week, reported that 2,916 votes were favorable to liquor and 6,819 for prohibition.

The number of votes polled throughout the county was 11,000, while the number polled in the Niagara Falls election taken on October 26, 1919, concurrently with the Provincial general election, was 11,340.
