The Department is aware that pressure is often brought to bear upon postmasters to exhibit notices of meetings for charitable and religious purposes, 'Lost' and 'Found' notices, etc., but it is considered that the Post Office proper should be given up wholly to the Post Office notices, and that official notices of the Department may receive the undivided attention which the public interest requires."

Germany Has Accepted the Allies Ultimatum

And Government Agree to Carry Out Terms Decided by the Allies

AN UNCONDITIONAL "YES" GIVEN

London, Eng., May 11.—Germany will say "Yes" to the ultimatum of the Allies to-day. Without waiting for the time limit of six days to expire, the Reichstag acted decisively yesterday, voting 230 to 176 for the acceptance of the London terms. It followed the advice of a new cabinet which has as its head Dr. Brüning, the leader of the "Centre" Party; and is composed of Social Democrats, Centrists and Democrats.

By accepting the ultimatum, Germany pledges herself to do these things:

1. Pay a total of \$2,000,000,000 of reparations at the rate of \$48,000,000 cash a year, plus 25 per cent of the amount of her exports.

2. Disarm "civilian" military bodies in Bavaria, Prussia and elsewhere.

3. Give up the invasion with the terms of the Allied "Accords" of Paris, January 23.

4. Punish immediately the persons guilty of war crimes.

5. Give guarantees to carry out her pledges.

Acceptance of the ultimatum finds Britain and Italy, as well as the United States, highly satisfied. The Allies put an end to the plan of France to invade the Ruhr. The French military preparations, however, have continued, and though the invasion was to be carried out even in the face of German acquiescence and French troops, not to be taken into consideration, possession of Muelheim, from which it is a step of less than four miles to Essen.

Meanwhile the Polish insurgents in Silesia are continuing their war to force a cessation of hostilities in that province. Britain and Italy are making ineffective protests against this intrigue, which is resulting in severe fighting in the Silesian region, taking part against the Poles.

Germany is rushing forces in the direction of Berlin and Berlin reports that a German blow is to be struck simultaneously with acceptance of the Allies ultimatum.
