WHITEWASHING THE "LAST POST"

The advanced party of the Guelph Rifles left Action and Georgetown on Thursday morning, June 16, and proceeded on their long journey to Toronto, and across the Lakes. Upon arrival they drew from the stores, tents, stoves, blankets and all the camp equipment for the long march which will commence the following day. Under the supervision of an Officer and Sergeant of the Permanent Force \$5 bell tent and a number of canvas beds were issued. This work was done under very unfavorable conditions of wind and weather as it rained the whole time until it was late afternoon. After a meal had been served everybody was ready for rest.

"Training started at 8:30 a.m. on Friday, and continued until 1 p.m. when the Drills were reviewed by a General Officer. A very marked improvement was noticeable in the men, even though they had been in the field for only a few days.
