## \$500,000 Loss in The Big Fire at Guelph Last Week

It was the Worst Conflagration in the History of the City

GALT, KITCHENER AND STRATFORD FIREMEN CALLED FOR

The conflagration on Wyndham Street, Guelph, last Wednesday, made clean sweep of all the property on the west side of the city's main street, from the Wyndham Inn to the premises of "Cantlant." The whole of the Hotel, Harston and Coffee blocks were annihilated. The splendid stocks in the planing mill, the boot and shoe store, the electric and plumbing stores and the candy store were destroyed.

With commendable enterprise nearly all the mercantile and manufacturing premises were destroyed or damaged. The loss is estimated at over half a million dollars.
