Our New Waterworks System

A very important communication appears elsewhere in this issue from the pen of a responsible and interested ratepayer of the town, respecting certain conditions alleged to exist in connection with our new waterworks system. It is clearly the duty of the Council, either through their owh officers or waterworks engineers, to satisfy "Ratepayer" and all other citizens of the municipality for that matter either that the alleged defects referred to do not exist, or that they will be promptly remedied. The ratepayers of Acton have a right to demand that the waterworks system they are paying for at a very high cost be satisfactorily adequate, or that the system be made adequate as promised it would be by the engineers at the outset of negotiations, and as the people of the town were given to understand they would be when the plans and specifications were prepared and the contracts awarded. There must no side-slepping of this important mater. The people demand that all anxiety respecting protection against fire and the possibility of unsanitary water be removed. They have a right to expect it. The reputation of the town is at stake in this important matter; indeed, public safety is at stake, if conditions exist as "Ratepayer" alleges.

"Wet" Militia Camps

"The statement of Col. Clark, of the York Rangers, that the recent camp at Niagara was the "wettest" he had seen in an experience of twenty-eight years should lead the authorities of the Militia Department to consider seriously the relations of the Department to the laws of the various Provinces in which the use of liquor for beverage purposes has been forbidden. The whole question will assuredly come up in Parliament, where the votes of the members from sever prohibition Provinces are likely to prevail. It is surely not too much to ask in the meanwhile that the strictest orders shall be given and carried out to prevent the violation of the anti-liquor laws of the various Provinces by the officers and men of the Permanent Force stationed in these Provinces or the Militis while under military discipline. A dry Canada will not stand for the sort of camp described by Col. Clark - Globe. Counties Grouped for Judicial Purposes

The counties of Simcoc, Peel, Halton and Dufferin have been grouped in one judicial district under the County Court Judges' Act of 1919, under which the number of judges is to be reduced, by not filling vacancies until all the junior Judges disappear. The Examiner is doubtful whether one Judge could do the work in a county the size of Simcoe. Our county town contemporary says: While this plan might be all right for smaller countles, it is difficult to see how one judge could take the Surrogate work, the County Court and the Division Courts in Simcoe. It has a population of fully 35,000 more than the combined population of Halton, Peel and Dufferin, and in it are a number of large-towns, which usually make more business for the courts than do rural sections. An examination of the amount of litigation coming up in this county is seen in the recent June sessions. 
