BANK-NOTE LAUNDRY

Washing bank-notes to make them presentable again is a rather unusual business that saves thousands of dollars every year. And this is the way of it. The process by which the paper is cleaned and made as good as new is as follows: The prime maple syrup is heated until it is soft, then sugar is added to it. This is then poured into a large tub and the bank notes are added. After being washed, the notes are dried and pressed.

In addition to the maple and sugar, there are various other ingredients.

From these they pass on to the last set of rollers, which are heated, and then the notes are washed again.

Finally, the bank notes are washed again.

Then they are dried and pressed.

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
