Make Thanksgiving Real

Our National Thanksgiving Day is fixed for nex Monday, November 7. It is good to live in a land where the mercies of a Bountiful Heavenly Father are acknowledged and the people of the nation are officially called upon to give thanks for the blessings of the year. But Thanksgiving is in a sense a failure if it is confined to the one day publicly proclaimed as Thanksgiving Day. We cannot be grateful spasmodically any more than we can play beautifully on the violin one day out of the year, and not touch the instrument at any other time. Gratitude is a grace and must be practiced like any other art. If we growled and complained through the summer because the weather was warm; if we have been grumbling through the fall over our work and the difficulties of life in general, if now we have a new grievance in the approach of winter, we need not imagine that our Thanksgiving Day is likely to be a success. The regulation turkey may grace the home table, and friendly faces gather about it, but it will not be -Thanksgiving Day if the thanksgiving spirit is left out. Thankfulness does not spring up in a night and grow tall and imposing, any more than the seed just dropped into the earth at once bears flowers and fruit. Gratitude should be cultivated as the days move by, each with its burden of blessing. It would have been well if we had begun to practice it long ago, but remember that nover again will we have a ' good time to begin as this very Thanksgiving Day of 1921.

The Business Influence of the Race Track

The merchants of the city of Windsor, in which city the race track and the aftendant race track gambling are rumpant, say the racing there is detrimental to business. A questionaire was sent out last week to the merchants of the city by the Secretary-Treasurer of the Retail Merchants' Association, asking their frank opinion of the effects of horse-racing there on business. Over two hundred merchants replied and they almost ununimously stated that the races seriously interfere with business. The reason given is that customers bet their money, and let their bills and other accounts run. All express the belief that there are too many days of racing and also too many race-tracks. That the city derives any temporary or permanent benefit from the tracks is denied 'by most of the responses, some of them declaring that the benefits derived by some few merchants is more than offset by the losses of the others. This economic view of the question is highly interesting. The fact that enquiry was not made through any social reform organization, or by any church or ministerial association, renders the situation all the more significant. It shows very conclusively that the hardheaded business man is weighing this question, as he did the liquor question, from the economic standpoint. The effect of this investigation will be viewed with keen interest. It is confirmatory of the position taken by the Attorney-General. It is hoped Ontario will soon be able to see it to be a moral duty to follow the example of the neighboring states and purge the province of this moral and business incubus.

The Attorney-General announces that the government will follow up the Gold Seal Liquor Company's appeal to the Privy Council if the company decides to carry the case-already twice decided against them in the lower courts-to that body. In any case, it is also stated by the Attorney-General, the provincial government will ask the dominion authorities for certain changes in the amending act that will have the effect of strengthening and clarifying the existing action. This regulaition will go forward in time for action at the next session of parliament.
