### The War Debts and Prohibition

An American paper raised a very significant question respecting the proposal heard in some quarters that the United States could well afford to cancel the war debts of the European Allies. It says: "Questions are raised in regard to the payment of war debts due the United States from the Allies. Supporters of prohibition in this country cannot but believe that no country can properly repudiate its Advocate. debt or ask to be relieved from the obligation, while the people of the United States are saving colossal sums of money through self-restraint in the matter of drink, and the debter countries are indulging freely in the liquor habit. France was as hard hit as any allied country and her financial burden is an extremely heavy one. 'Yet, according to a member of the French government, France is devoting three million acres of land to the production of grapes and other materials out of which to make a billion gallons of wine. An individual who did that and then pleaded that his debts be forgiven because of his inability to pay them, would be told to cease to use his land, labor, and time in the production of a commodity without material value to him and which tended only to vice and waste. If that is true of an individual, it is even more true of a nation. Until France stops the waste that is due to alcoholic inthe things necessary to life, she will have no ground upon which to have her debts cancelled. We are not wasting time, land, labor or men in the production of alcoholic drinks. For the sake of ourselves and the rest of the world, we have put an end to that vicious business."

# The Man of the Hour
