"Conscious Civilization Against Armed Warfare"

"There must be, and there shall be, the commanding voice of a conscious civilization against armed warfare." In this pledge, uttered with the profoundest solomnity on the third unniversary of the cessation of fighting in the world's greatest war, President Harding of the United States proclaimed to foreign delegates grouped about him in the amphitheatre at Arlington, the spirit with which that country will take its position at the conference which seeks relief from the insupportable burden of arma monts.

"I don't believe this disarmament conference at Washington can do everything. I am personally confident, it can do much. 
