- Boys Out With Firearms
- For having a rifle in his possession and firing off cartridges in the woods and danger of the neighbors, Guydon Connor, a lad of twelve years, brought his father, W. D. TAKE THEM AT THEIR WORD

Mr. McGehee and his friends say that the tariff is the only issue in this election. That is not true, but if it were, the Government could not afford to be judged by the record on this tariff. The failure to confirm the tariff by the House of Commons is the only evidence of stagnation, instability, unemployment and lack of confidence. That record of the "Liberal" Government in 1907 after 18 years of Conservative administration. Then came the 12 Liberal years of progress and prosperity. We give Conservative testimony as to that record. The Liberal Government was defeated in September, 1911. The Conservative Government then came into power and in November of the same year prepared the budget which set the throne, which contained these words:

"It affords me great pleasure to congratulate you upon the confidence and increasing prosperity of the country. Our trade both with British and foreign countries is rapidly expanding and there is every prospect that it will be in the present year, will be largely in excess of that attained at any time in the past."

Mr. Now Sir Thomas, White House Minister of Finance. The ton was increased by the doubling prosperity existing at the close of the fifteen year Liberal administration, and so frankly testifies to the fact that in these remarkable words:

"I will, as I have said before, be gratified to all that the material prosperity with which we have been so highly favored still continues to be our portion. Despite the serious vicissitudes through which the Western world has passed and the unusual heat experienced in the Province of Ontario during the past summer, the field crops of Canada show a beautiful yield, and with the high prices prevailing for practically all its products the great basic industry of agriculture continues in a flourishing condition. Almost every department of trade and commerce shows expansion. Our mines are wonderfully productive. Our coal fields, notably the Atlantic, have enjoyed a good catch and high price. Our manufacturers are thriving and new industries are springing up throughout the whole Dominion. Railway construction especially in the West, proceeds apace, preparing a way for settlement in districts not yet opened up and for trade with the westward-bound provinces. Our increased bank deposits, clearing and circulation, the amount of public and private building operations in municipal and business structures, extensions to the country, all attest that the general prosperity of Canada at the present time is very great."

This was the handsome testimony given in 1911 by a Conservative Minister of Finance, the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie King, the master of his subject, to the work of his Liberal predecessors, and especially of Mr. Pridgen, one of the leading men of the Liberal party to-day, whose experience and knowledge will undoubtedly be used in the framing of the new tariff.

Mr. White went on to say that Canada to continue to be the land of promise for the home-saver, the immigrant coming in at the rate of thousands a day and labor conditions good. The future of Canada, he said, looked bright indeed.

Now after another period of Conservative rule, the Conservative literature comes out with a doleful wail about stagnation, instability, unemployment and lack of confidence and the Toronto Telegram mourns over the exodus of over 500,000 Canadians to the United States in 10 years. Canadians are apparently rushing to take refuge out of Canada to escape the consequences of Conservative rule. It may be that our Conservative friends are taking too gloomy a view. Doomed themselves to defeat, they imagine that the whole country is heading for disaster. If they are telling the truth or anything near the truth, it is time for a change.
