A Whiskey Still at Milton

Fred Morley's House Raided, Still Found, and a Fine of \$500 Imposed

A few weeks ago officers of the Inland Revenue Department went to Mississauga to search for a whiskey still alleged to be in operation there by a man named Fred Morley. They found the location and information that a still had been at work, but the apparatus had been removed.

On Wednesday evening of last week Mississauga police officers of Toronto visited Milton with two detectives, and made a raid on the house of Fred Morley. There they found a distilling outfit consisting of copper works, ordinary copper boiler, a large still, capacity about five gallons, to hold cold water and the worm.

The three parts were hidden in different places. There was no still.

On Thursday morning Fred Morley was brought before Police Magistrate Dico, charged under the Inland Revenue Act with having in his possession a still. He pleaded guilty, and was fined \$500, plus \$50 costs.
