Dr. and Mrs. Farmer are members of the United States Committee, and to welcome the advent of his first grandchild there:

To the Editor of The Times-Picayune:

Many of your readers will have travelled Europe and may be interested in the views I have on the continent which they have not done so, the following running remarks may be of interest.

In Canada and in the United States, we travel in privacy and do not care to do certain things such as sitting on the sidewalk, smoking on trains, or throwing matches or rubbish out of the car windows. Here we are merely more careful not to do so, and the difference is negligible. In Europe, however, it may result to others by such conduct are philosophically set before us.

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
