THE HIGHWAY TO COME DOWN Mill Street

Was the Sentiment Expressed at a Meeting of Citizens in Town Hall Tuesday Evening

MR. SMITH AND MR. GREGG OF DEPARTMENT PRESENT

The meeting called for Tuesday
evening by the Rev. Mr. Hart to discuss the
route that the citizens of Acton were
in favor of having the Provincial
Highway follow, was well attended. Mr. Smith, of the Department
of Public Highways addressed the
meeting and answered all ques-
tions. Mr. Gregg, the resident engineer
of the Highway, in regard to the
construction of the highway, spoke
briefly.

In the course of his remarks Mr.
Smith brought up the striking
discrepancy in the highway route
from Georgetown to Guelph, and the
proposed check line route from
Georgetown to Guelph.

The grades on parts of the check
line were almost impossible for frame
and when the road was paved would
severely handicap traffic, that this
route was not suitable for the
highway. The check line route
was also considered unsatisfactory
because it would be necessary to
cross the Grand River at Mill Street
and joining up with the Main Street
crossing, but, considered Mill Street
crossing the town and up Mill Street
to the track. The only objection
to putting the highway down Mill
Street was that Mr. Smith could
see no way to make future agreement
between the town and the Department
and the highway between the town and
the highway.

The matter of building a subway or
overhead bridge at Mill Street
crossing is apparently not on the plan
for the time being, as the town
over, that gates and a policeman
would likely be put on at this point.
The cost of this safeguard would have
to be paid by the town, but the Department
agreed to bear the cost of the highway
between the town and the highway.

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
