SEED TIME AND THE OAT SUPPLY

The unfortunate crop conditions in 1902 in many parts of Canada, especially for oats, led the Head Purchasing Commission of the Head Branch of Ottawa, to hold in reserve considerable amounts of grain, the surplus bushels of No. 1 seed oats for the spring's sowing. This grain was stored in government interior granaries at Guelph, Cambridge, Kitchener, Waterloo, and Galt, and in the spring of 1902, when the cost of the re-sown seed was added to the net cost of the re-cleaned seed, it is understood that reaching recent market bankers and other firms proposed in encouraging merchants to be cautious. Now, in reaching the Head Commissioners, it is indicated that seed merchants have been advised by these associations to have in mind the following suggestion: Supply of seed grain to meet the full requirements. So much of the success of a crop depends on the quality of the seed, that it is important to get the proper seeding time arrived that farmers who have not already secured their full supply of seed should do so without further delay, said by the Director of Publicity, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
