### With Gas Assured

Great Excitement Aroused Over Drilling Deeper Wells in Caledon Mountains

With most eminent authorities and engineers in agreement as to the extraordinary possibilities for the Caledon Gas and probably all fields at Ingleswood, including the three wells, with investments of their own, together with securing leasehold rights around the Dover Oil Company's 500 acre tract in the vicinity, with the sinking of deeper wells for a larger commercial supply of natural gas and increasing production with the use of more powerful pumps, the excitement and interest in the Caledon Gas field is spreading rapidly in the vicinity of the wells, but in Orangeville, Ingersoll, Acton and Georgetown and interesting points, where numerous pipe lines are contemplated, the growing excitement and interest in the possibilities at their very doors and are investing in the Caledon Gas field.
