SHALE ACCEPTABLE AS FUEL

Rallroads in Esthonia soom in & fair way to diseard coul in favor of bituninous shale, a substance common nough in geological formations to make the Ethonian experiment widely interesting. Lucking coal, the Esthonian provisional government has been investigating the possibilities of shale. and, as the report comes by way of Holaingfors, shale is now being used for a good many purposes. The gas factory at lieval, for example, is using shale exclusively for making gas. But, so far, shule has not been adopted us a fuel, and wood is being burned in the fire-boxes, The factory probably waits to see how competely shale can be used to run rullway trains, and the railway factory in Reval is now experimenting with fire-boxes suftable to using shale in a locomotive. That is can be successfully used, however, seems to have been proved. Cost is a strong argument for the use of shale, and three marks for a pood, or some 30 or 40 pounds of shale, us uguinst 30 marks for the same mousure of coal makes it very much cheaper. 
