The company found the following information in "Nothing But Names," giving the origin of the names of the counties and townships of Ontario. It was written by H. F. Gardiner, formerly editor of the Hamilton Times.

This is what it said about Halton: "Halton County, organized 1216. This county was named after Major William Ifalton, who was secretary to Mr. Fredrick (lore, Lieutenant-Governor of Opper Canada, 1806-1811, 1816-1817. After his return to England Mr. Halton noted as agent for Upper Canada and was engaged in editing the manuscript Journals of the province.
