Halton Liberals

Will Put Nominee in Coming Election

The Annual Meeting Held Last Saturday will be Followed by Convention

THE EXECUTIVE ELECTED FOR EACH MUNICIPALITY OF THE COUNTY

At the annual meeting of the Halton Liberal Association held at Milton on Saturday, every polling subdivision in the county was represented.

The meeting was opened by Dr. D. Kirby, Past President of the East York Liberal Club, and Chairman of the Ontario Liberal Association.

Mr. Kirby confined most of his remarks to the subject of organization work, and advised the Liberals in Halton to begin organizing at once and get now into the field to help all the young people with Liberal feelings to join the association.

The Conservatives, he said, were trusting in a strong and solid organization of their forces to defeat the Liberal Government next year.

The Liberals should, and could, do the same.

Resolutions of confidence in Right Hon. Mackenzie King and Wellington Hay were passed.

A meeting of the Executive was held immediately after the general meeting and it was decided to put a candidate in the field to contest the seat in the coming election. A convention for this purpose will be held shortly.

Many of the outstanding Liberals of Halton, and other members of the community, were present at the convention.

It was decided that Dr. D. Kirby will be nominated.

The Liberals generally are satisfied with the manner in which Hon. E. C. Drury, the minister of agriculture, and Mr. McCall, of the ministry of the provinces, are carrying out their responsibilities.

The mail and Empire says: "It was learned on the authority of Mr. Carl Campbell, lumberman, of Milton, that Dr. McColl, of Milton, president of the Halton Liberal Association, will be the candidate.

Mr. Cleaver, of Burlington, is also mentioned.

Mr. D. Kirby, Past President of the Ontario Liberal Association, has been invited to speak at the meeting.
