A destructive windstorm passed over the centre of the county last Friday afternoon, starting from the west in the lower end of the township of Nassageweys, the wind took the roofs off several barns, large trees were uprooted. In Esquesing, at the Cottrelle farm on the second line many of the trees in the apple orchard were blown down and destroyed. At the MucNab homestead in Esquesing one of the barns was blown four feet away from its foundation and other damage done. At the Mount Dairy Farm, near Milton Heights, one of the buildings was struck by lightning and the roof partly lestroyed by fire.

In the Wake of Monday's Storm Monday's cyclone did much damage this and adjoining counties. It is reported that thirty or more barns were unroofed between here and Oakville. In this vicinity Fyte Somerville lost the roof of his driving shed. Charles Derby, on the Knatchbull line, had his barn practically demokshed, and the verandah torn off his house. At Dolly Yarden the roof was torn off the barn of the Toronto Lime Co. Mr. John Newton, of the fourth line, had part of his barn roof blown off. The barns of Nell Gillies, on the third line, George Lealle, on the fourth, and Thomas Bird, on the fifth, were all badly damaged.
