The New Transformers Of 300 H. P. Capacity Being Installed at the Hydro Power House

The use of Hydro-current for light heat and power in Acton is increasing so rapidly that capacity of the transformers ut the Hydro power house has become inadequate. In order to meet the present and growing demand for capacity of the power station here. On Monday three new transformers. with a capacity of 100 h. p. of electric C. N. R. station to the power house Islands and the St. Lawrence. by the Hydro installation gang from Kitchener. It will be several weeks before the new transformers are connected up to our present system. In the meantime provision is being made for the distribution of current through fown upon an improved basis.
