Milton Man Fined on Four Charges. Six Drunkenness, Four Assaulted on August 6

On Saturday William Sheppard, Jr., was on trial before Judge Phipps. Attorney-General Nickle at Work

Will See the Laws Under His Jurisdiction Enforced

Hon. W. F. Nickle, the new Attorney-General, who was sworn in on Monday, has assumed the duties of his office and evidently intends that the laws which come under his purview shall be enforced.

In an interview with the Toronto Star on Tuesday Hon. Mr. Nickle said: "I am sending out a letter to-morrow to all the Crown Attorneys in the province advising them of what the Attorney-General's office is to be expected to do, and stating that it is to be enforced."

This was the answer given by Hon. W. F. Nickle, who took his desk yesterday morning at the Parliament Buildings, following a brief meeting with the Attorney-General, who was asked by the Star as to whether the Government would take with regard to the enforcement of the law.

"Yes, we have considered it," said the Attorney-General. "It is a law, and as such it must be enforced. The law is to be enforced by a law."

"Do you propose any change in the administration of the O. T. A.?" he was asked.

"That set on the books, is it not?" he asked. "Then it must be enforced."

Following the cabinet council meeting with the day's Attorney-General went directly to his office and began to wade into the business that awaits him.
