War's Dreadful Toll in Human Misery

The fearful toll of the war in the way of crippled men has been summarized by the experts who are now in Geneva to attend the conference, summoned by the International Labor Bureau to study the question of the employment of war cripples, and have received a report giving an estimate of the number of war cripples receiving pension. figures are: Germany, 1,547,000; Australia, 75,000; Austria, 164,000; Belgium, 50,000; Canada, 45,000 United States, 157,000; Finland, 10,000; France, 7,500,000; Great Britain, 1,170,000; Italy, 1,000,000; Poland; 320,000; Rumania, 100,000; Jugoslavia, 164, 000; Russia, 775,000; Czechoslovakia, 236,000; New Zealand, 20,000.-To this total of 7,334,000 pensioned war cripples should be added all those of Turkey, Bulgaria, Portugal, Hungary and Japan and the Baltic States, so that the estimated grand total is swept off every morning by that time, so that the such as that suggested will be beneficial to any town.

A SILO FOR CHICKENS

A supply of green feed for laying ions in winter is sometimes hard to get; but if winter eggs are to be expocted, there must be a green ration fed along with other feeds. For a number of years I gathered reen materal during the summer months, and dried .it for winter use. This plan was very successful, but last winter I tried a different plana poultry silo in which I kept my green ration in its natural state. Pirst, I make an opening about four

fitted with a flap that fits snugly, and barrel to drain off excess fluid. . The sile is then ready for filling. I need green feed of all descriptions. auch as clover, grass from the lawn, eat. After the barrel was filled, a lid that could be removed readily was the barrel. A weight was then placed

As the feed is taken out from below, the contents of the barrel will be pushed downward. It is not necessary It can be partly filled, and more green stuff added as opportunity offers. A barrel of this feed will furnish enough green stuff for thirty or forty hers during the winter.

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
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
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
