PREVENTION OF TYPHOID FEVER

Typhold fever is an infectious disease; it cannot occur unless the germ gets into the body and finds there conditions favorable to its growth. The disease is not contagious in the strict sense of the word: it is not necessary to come into close relationship with one who is either sick with the disease or has recently had it in order to acquire it: the germs may be

carried in food or drink. The main channels of infection are the water supply and the milk supply. In most of our cities the water is in no danger of being contaminated, and so is the milk in the many cities where it is required to be Pasteurised. As a result the death rate from typhold fever in cities has fallen remarkably: the few cases that do occur come usualty through salads and uncooked vegetables that have been either washed with impure water or contaminated Christ," we have the gospel in miniaby flies, which carry. the germs on their feet. 




