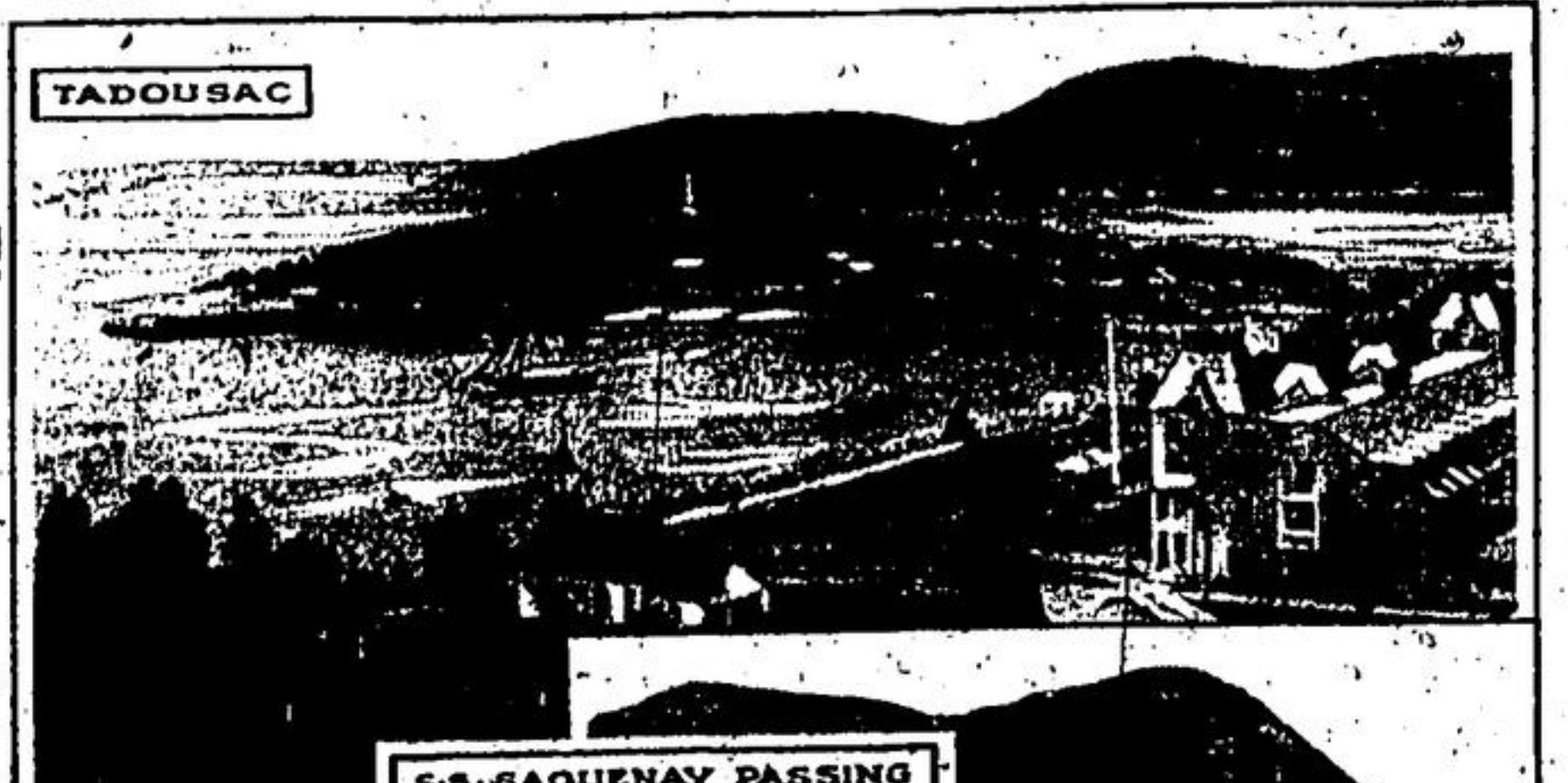

Tadouac and the Awe-Inspiring Saguenay



S-S. GAGUENAY PASSING TRINITY CLIFF

Few people in Canada are aware of the fact that, historically speaking, Tadouac is a town of some importance, situated at the mouth of the awe-inspiring river Saguenay, a hundred and forty miles below Quebec, in one of the richest sections of Canada.

It was first discovered by Jacques Cartier, and today is one of the principal sailing stations of the Canadian Steamship Lines on the St. Lawrence River. In 1699 Pierre de Chauvin and Pont-Grave landed there from France, and erected the first real house in Canada.

Pont-Grave, during the death of Chauvin, brought the famous Champlain to Canada. He landed at Tadouac on May 26, 1603, and was greeted by more than a thousand Indians, who were feasting to the French. Champlain, the same year, explored the new world-famed Saguenay, described recently by Sir Hall Galt, M. P., as the "Wonderland of the World."

The French established the first mission in this country. Not only is Tadouac recognized for the first house; the first mission, but also for the first church ever built in the Dominion, which forms the picturesque centre of the town. It is said to be the oldest place of worship in America.

The village was destroyed by fire in 1828, and the church constructed twenty years later. During all these years the main outlines of the building have been preserved. The village, which is the principal watering place in the lower St. Lawrence, and boasts of a magnificent hotel, built on the Saguenay river view. Trout and lake-trout abound plentifully in the nearby lakes.

But the Saguenay! The most wonderful river in the world! Out through ever-haunted ice, it flows with a force and power that has made it a river of the world. Its depth is not only awesome, but has a magnificent grandeur which is unrivaled in any other river, with its cliffs towering above the waters to a height of 1,500 feet, rugged and precipitous. The sun, not throwing its fiery rays across the darkening sky, produces a picture which no artist can emulate and no pen can describe. To realize its real grandeur one has to see it. Darkness overshadows us as we approach Cape Trinity and Cape Henry, and it would seem that we are in a huge cavern from which there can be no escape. The gigantic cliffs tower over us like grim sentinels. It is as if we were entering the winding labyrinth of some subterranean cavern, the stream itself, "the river of death," such is the Saguenay.
