Police Court News

Fred King, alias Harold White, Sentenced to Two Years and Bix Months in Kimpston Penitentiary

Fred King, who plended gullty the week before to the theft of money and goods from Charles A. Elsley, morchant, Campbellville, to a considerable amount, came up before Police Magisrate Moore for sentence at the Court House, Milton, last Thursday. In the neantime further information had been secured as to his provious history and it was nacortained that he had been in trouble at Newmarket and in Trafalgar.
