Improving the Roads of Canada

Canada is spending millions of dollars annually upon road construction in an effort to provide for the increasing traffic that is using the highways for purposes of communication.... A bulletin issued by the Highways Branch of the Department of Railways and Canals states that on January 1, 1923, there were 447,384 miles of highways under control of the provinces, counties, townships and rural municipalities. When the mileage of streets in certain centres is added it will be realized how important is the selectween the provinces and Dominion to be paid for ment of Hon. Howard Ferguson. jointly under the Canada Highways Act, amounted in value to \$27,542,456, covering 4,820 miles. Quebec proved roads out of a total of 45,000 miles of roadways in the province, and has expended thereon \$40,000,000. Manitoba, likewise, has built 3,001 miles of roads to the standard required under the Canada Highways Act, at an expenditure of \$9,182,921. Ontario has spent on good roads building during the three years 1919-22, \$64,148,252, of which counties and townships contributed \$27,528,521 and the province \$36,619,730. The total mileage of improved roads in Ontario up to the end of 1922 was approxi mately 28,000 miles, or 56 per cent. of the total road mileage.

Canadian Wheat to Brazil

For the first time in the history of the Canadian grain trade, wheat is being exported from Canada to the South American continent, one of Canada's largest export firms having the honor of making this first shipment from Winnipeg to Rio de Janeiro, capital of Brazil. Brazil has always been an importer of both wheat and flour, doing a large trade in the latter commodity especially, and naturally secured its requirements from nearby Argentine, but the present time is between seasons in the south and the Brazilian millers required Canadian wheat for blending purposes. NATURAL GAS AT EDMONTON

Recently thousands of Edmontor people saw the official opening of the Edmonton gas system, when Mayor Duggan lighted the flame on the high DR. F. G. GOLLOP, D.D.S., L.D.S. pressure line crossing the Fifth Street bridge. Northwestern Utilities Limited, the gas company, is starting out with 3,000 customers. In the installation of their system this company inade un Alberta record for rapid work. The gas is piped about \$5 miles, from Viking. Starting work in July the long pipe line was completed by the end of October, the city distribution system being ready for service a few days later. The gas supply in the proven area at Viking is estimated at sixty billion cubic feet. The ten wells drilled for the Edmonton system have a daily

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


