Defeat Historic British Parties

Premier Baldwin and the Conservative Government Defeated by Over 70 Majority

THE ADVENT OF RAMSEY MACDONALD AS THE FIRST LABOR PRIME MINISTER AN UNPRECEDENTED EVENT

London, January 22—Yesterday for the first time in a hundred years a British Government was overthrown by a vote in the House of Commons by a vote in the King's address that the present Ministers did not have the confidence of Parliament.

The climax after a week's debate came at a crowded excited House when a division was taken on Ramsay MacDonald's confidence address. The Government was overthrown by a vote of 152 to 77.

The Labor party, which had been in opposition since the election of 1918, won a decisive victory. Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the party, was sworn in as Prime Minister.

The Labor party's victory was a surprise to many, as the Conservative Government had been expected to continue in office.

The new Prime Minister, Ramsay MacDonald, is a member of the Labor party and was previously a member of the Liberal party.

The Labor party's victory was a result of a coalition of votes from the party's own members and from other parties.

The new Government is expected to continue in office for some time.

At the inaugural meeting of Halton County Council, Acton was honored by the election of George Barber as Warden for the year 1924. Two names were prominent before the meeting in addition to that of Mr. Barber, Mr. George Hillmer, M. P., of Oakville, and Messrs. J. H. Forster, of Oakville, and Mr. W. H. Miller, of Acton.

\$11,855,300 of Insurance in Force, Covered by 3,851 Policies

The annual meeting of Halton Union Farmers' Mutual Fire Insurance Company will be held in the town hall, Acton, next Monday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock.

The report for the year will be presented. It shows a large volume of business, prompt payment of losses, and good prospects for the present year.

The Company has \$11,855,300 of insurance at risk, of which \$4,332,000 was placed during the year.

The losses for 1923 aggregated \$41,165. These losses were incurred in 48 cases where the loss was \$25 or over, and \$32,650 for fires where the loss was less than that amount. Twenty-one of the losses are reported to have been caused by lightning.

The highest loss of the year was incurred during the heavy and continued rain of H. D. Shewwood, Nelson, where fire, through fire from a gasoline engine, lost the loss was \$7,600.
