

CANNOT DISPENSE WITH CAN-ADIAN WHEAT

The superior quality of Canadian hard spring wheat is recognised by the United States millers, especially by operators in the Northwestern States. Even at the high rate of duty imposed by the Furdney tariff large quantities of Canadian wheat continue to pass over the border at Duluth to be used in improving the quality of American flour. According to United States customs service reports, the importations of wheat at Duluth 8,763,687 bushels in 1921; 343,166 bushols in 1922, and 1,010,128 for the first eleven months of 1021. Even with the amount of Canadian wheat soing into the Northwestern States, flour milling is not flourishing. According to the Northwestern National Bank Review. published in Minneapolis, flour mills in that state were in December running at one-half capacity or less, and the output was booked almost entirely for domestic trade. In contrast with this; the readers of this Review are told, Canadian mills are running at full capacity on export demand.
