Canada Tax Rate Lowest in the Empire

It is interesting, and often encouraging to comof national taxation. In 1914 our per capita taxation was \$21.21; last year this had increased to \$42.63. In Australia in 1914 the people there paid \$27.39; they now pay \$57.32. New Zealand in 1914 . was paying \$55.32 per head; they now pay \$96.03. South is making a sincere effort to come out with a balance every possible direction. This country is in favorable position; its future is not mortgaged beyond the point of redemption. The call to-day is for a vision necessary to make that vision come true.

Team-play and Co-operation Necessary

J. B. Reynolds, President of the Ontario Agricultural College, speaking at Cainsville the other day, deplored the lack of team-play, such as that which carried the Canadian Olympic hockey team to victory, on the part of the farmers of Ontario. The farmer, he declared, would not play the game in the spirit of team-play. An irksome task was discipline, and all, especially the farmers, were in need of this discipline. Revenue Increasing; Debt Decreasing

The net debt of Canada was reduced by \$4,149,495 in January over December, and by \$8,501,300 compared with a year ago, according to the January financial statement as sent out in a press despatch. Revenue increased by \$810,466 in the month and expenditure by \$2,130,091. In the twelve months there was a total increase of \$6,056,124 in revenue over the same preceding twelve months and a total decrease of \$378,345.10 in the expenditure for the same preceding twelve months. The total gross debt of Canada on January 31, 1924, was \$2,037,161,043.04, and the total net debt on that date was \$2,411,388,-604.54. _____


