Last year there was r. manifest evidence of disintegration in places, and the consolidation of the road bed can only be preserved by a liberal coating of tarvia macadam or asphalt. The contractors for the new Toronto-Sarnia Highway, which traverses both Mill and Main Streets, will be engaged on the outside sections of the highway the coming season, and will, no doubt, have the necessary machinery on the ground, and material casily available, and satisfactory arrangements may be made with them to undertake this important work. Their experience in road-building will be worth securing for the proposed undertaking.
