A PROPOSITION FOR A JUBILEE PARK TO MARK ACTON'S JUBILEE
The regular meeting of the Council was held Monday evening, with Councillors Nicol and Holmes present, and Rev. A. C. Stewart, M. A., in the chair. The Finance Committee presented their 5th report, and recommended payment of the following accounts:
