## Hig Liquor Seizure at Port Nelson

### \$12,000 Worth of Liquor Seized in Round-up of Bootlegging Gang on Saturday

Morning

Liquor valued at \$12,000 was solved

by Toronto and Hamilton O. T. A. officers at 3 o'clock Saturday morning, when an attempt was made to rethe cargo out after it had been unloaded from a boat near Port Nelson. John Wynn, Steven Street, Lamilton, driver of the truck, which contained 107 cades of Goodherham's whiskey, was taken into custody, and the bottles were transferred to; the dispensary, Hamilton, pending shipment to Toronto for analysis. Further investigations are being expected. It is said one of the biggest bootlegging rings in the Dominion is involved in the seizure. Information was received to the effect that, a shipment was on the way up the lake and would arrive near Burlington. The plan of the owners was to transfer it to a vacant farmbouse. A Toronto squad, under Inspector Elliott, assisted the local officers and the guards watched the spot from after midnight Friday. At three o'clock Saturday morning, they spot ted an auto on the highway signalling to a truck, which had driven down a Miss Elsie Wiggins, of Toronto, Wynn, and took charge of the load. spent the week-end at her home here. The accomplices made their escape. The district was searched and the slouths visited an untenanted farmhouse. Lookouts sounded a warning and a gang of men made good their escape.
