Anniversary is Missionary in Character

Knox Church Celebrates Its Seventy-ninth Anniversary in Unique Manner

THE MISSIONARY OPPORTUNITIES OF THE CHURCH EMPHASIZED ED BY DR. WATERS, OF INDIA

Dr. J. M. Waters, of India, was the
preacher at the seventy-ninth anniversary
of Knox Church last Sunday.

The Dr. has been a very successful
missionary in India for the past ten
years, and his efforts are still seconded
by Mrs. Waters. His information
concerning India, the people of the
country, the methods pursued in
teaching the natives, the results, as well
as the connection of India with the
missions, is most valuable.

It was certainly an unique method
of observing a church anniversary, it
was evidently fitting for a church
whose congregation this year has far
overpassed the missionary objectives
fixed by the budget for the church
year. It was also fitting that the
minister, the minister, and the
congregation, which is so vitally
interested in missions, should have
the opportunity presented, the methods
for the spread of the gospel which
have been followed, and to report the
considerable successes which have already
been achieved.

The weather was not propitious but
the church was well filled at both
services. In the evening the pastor
addressed the congregation, and Rev.
Mr. J. M. Waters, of India, was invited
to speak.

In the morning Dr. Waters gave a
most interesting report of the work
which is undertaken by the church
in the way of medical service for the
advancement of the welfare of the
people of the mission districts, and
alms to the poor.

The matter was discussed at length
and the members decided to give a
large sum to the Indian Missions.

It was decided to submit the system to a
