URGENT NEED FOR FULL-TIME CHRISTIAN WORKERS—Matt. 10: 1-14

Golden Text—Freely ye received, freely give—Matt. 10: 8.

The Text Explained

Verse 1.—He called unto him—This passage should be read in connection with the preceding verses. There we have Christ's commission for the sheep without a shepherd; here we have the necessity appointed to send the sheep. Who were these sheep? Not in this case heathen, not the despised Gentiles. The multitudes who followed Jesus were Jews.

Verse 2.—The names—Notice that this was not a list of names of the disciples. That had taken place some time before this, but it is not anywhere definitely related by the evangelists. The twelve apostles—They are called disciples as those who learn from a teacher, and apostles as those who are appointed to bear the message. Our Lord seems to have had the twelve patriarchs, heads of the twelve tribes, in mind when he was choosing the twelve disciples.

Verse 3.—Phillip—A resident of Bethsaida; among the earliest of the disciples. He seems to have been of plain, practical nature, not fit to perceive spiritual truth and needing to be taught the things of God. He was called by the name of the fisherman, and was a fisherman.

Verse 4.—As ye go, preach—This was the great work of the apostles, that of evangelizing the world. Their work was to be done in every city, town, or village, and to every individual or group of hearers that they might meet on their journey.
