The purpose of this by-law is to utherian the berrowing of \$2,800.00 by lamilps debentures therefor with interest at five and one half per cent. The principal and interest of said debentures being repayable in fifteen equal annual instalments of \$272.32 each for the purpose of providing inpressed fire protection by (1.)-Installing an eight inch watermain from the Acton Tanning Company's fire pumps to a point about 256 feet north-west to connect with the proposed 216 foot Street, and to connect the said pumpe with the municipal watermains, (2)-Installing on the Acton Tanning Company's fire pumps one pedestal ohlorinating machine for use in the event of fire making it advisable or neceseary to pump Fairy Lake water through the municipal watermains, as approved of by the Provincial Board of Health.
