One of the commonest means of reproducing a signature is to put the genuino one on a piece of glass, lay another piece of glass on top of it? and fasten the plece of paper that is to receive the forgery on top of that. Then by holding the glass strips to a' bright light, the original signature casts a shadow that may be traced through in pencil. From the tracing, the ink forgery is completed. When a forgery done in this way is put under a strong magnifying glass, it will not bear scrutiny: "If the original has a strong downward stroke on the capital letters, the movemen will be free, and will leave the per lines with smooth edges. The man who is tracing such letters cannot trust himself to the same free movement of the pen, and the result, under




