The proposed amendments to the Ontario Temperance Act, introduced in the province in the Ontario House last Thursday, and strongly given reading. IMPROVED CONDITIONS IN MANITOBA

This Association expects to ship a large quantity of eggs per week during the summer season. Co-operative marketing has very strong in the West, and is proving a wonderful success. The farmers in marketing their products in the West are very optimistic. Mr. Storey states that their Association obtained for their shippers three money per pound for their turkeys last year, which was a great improvement over the price obtained for the same birds in the City of Winnipeg.

Mr. Storey is very optimistic about the future of the poultry business in Manitoba, and expects to see a great increase in the production of poultry in the West.
