THE CHURCH AT ANTIOCH. Acts 11: 19-30. Golden Text .- The disciples were called Christians first in Antioch, Acts 11: 26.

Time.-A. D. 42,43. Place.-Antioch. The Lesson-Explained 1. Great Revival at Antioch. 19-21. It took years for them to learn that the Gospel was for men of every nation. There are a goood many protessed Christians in these days who have not learned it even yet; they think the gospel is only for the English, and Americans and the Scotch and a few other nations. But while those early Christians had not as yet learned all things, they had learned some-things well: (1) What to preach -"The Word" (What a pity that so muny of our twentleth century preachers do not know that "The Word of God" is the one thing and the only thing to preach; (2) how to preach-"Speaking the word" (R.V.). 



THE SEPTIC TANK

'It, consists of a large concrete tank divided into two compartments by a vertical partition. The size for a single house is about four by eight feet, and three and a half feet deep. This tank holds the sewerage long enough for a certain kind of bacteria to destroy the solld matter. When the liquid accumulates to a certain amount a nonmechanical affair called a siphon empties one of the chambers into a system of field tile, called the absorption bed. hid shallow under the ground. And remaining sewage is destroyed in the soil by another kind of bacteria that lives near the top of the ground. In this way those friendly bacteria are enabled to do a very valuable work for us. This is science applied to a useful purpose.
