**GUELPH DROVER KILLED BY MOTOR**  
Alex. White Dies Instantly in Accident Near Winham

Planned beneath his motor car when it overturned shortly after noon last Thursday, Alex. White, well-known cattle buyer of Guelph, was instantly killed.

According to the story told by the other occupants of the wrecked machine, Mr. White had been driving at a very moderate rate of speed near the hamlet of Carruthers, when the motor struck a patch of soft, loose gravel on the road.

When the driver attempted to pull over to the right, the motor, which was under control of the highway, after swerving sharply from one side to the other, turned completely over, pinning Mr. White beneath it, and causing instant death.
