Laying the Dust of the Streets. Municipal Officer McPherson has been busp coating portions of Main, Bower and Church Streets with calcium chlorine during the week. This substance, it is claimed, will control the dust, if sufficient is used. The coating being given as an experiment, is only about one-half what is recommended by the manufacturers of the Dowflake Catcium Chlorine preparation. The result can hardly be as satisfactory as if the directions were followed. It is hoped, however, that the pest of dust will in some measure be abated. The calcium preparation is not suitable for he Mill Street roadway in the busiiess section, as it would have a tendency to disintegrate the tarvia and lamage the present good surface of he roadway. A coat of tarvis und ine stone may be given this section of the street.
