Quebec, Que., July 20 .- His Eminence Cardinal Louis Nazairo Begin. Archbishop of Quebec and Primate of the Roman Catholic Church in Canada, died early Saturday morning in the Archbishop's Palace, of uremia, with which disease he was stricken last Sunday night. The body lies in state in the chapel of his residence. where it will remain until Saturday morning, when it will be interred in the crypt alongside the remains of other archbishops of Guebeci

Cardinal Begin was overcome on his

return from St. Nazaire on Sunday. He made a gallant fight against death, and on Friday evening the reports issuing from his palace were of a hopeful nature, but the aged prelate suffered a relapse on Saturday morning and rank rapidly thereafter. His Eminence was consicious to the end and died very peacofully. It was due only to his remarkable strong constitution that Cardinal Begin battled so long with the illness that had overtaken him. Yesterday morning it began to be realized that the deceased Cardinal was sinking rapidly, and in the course of the afternoon the members of the clergy were summoned while the sacrament of Holy Communion was administered by Monsigner Langleis, coadjutor of Quebeo, at six o'clock.
