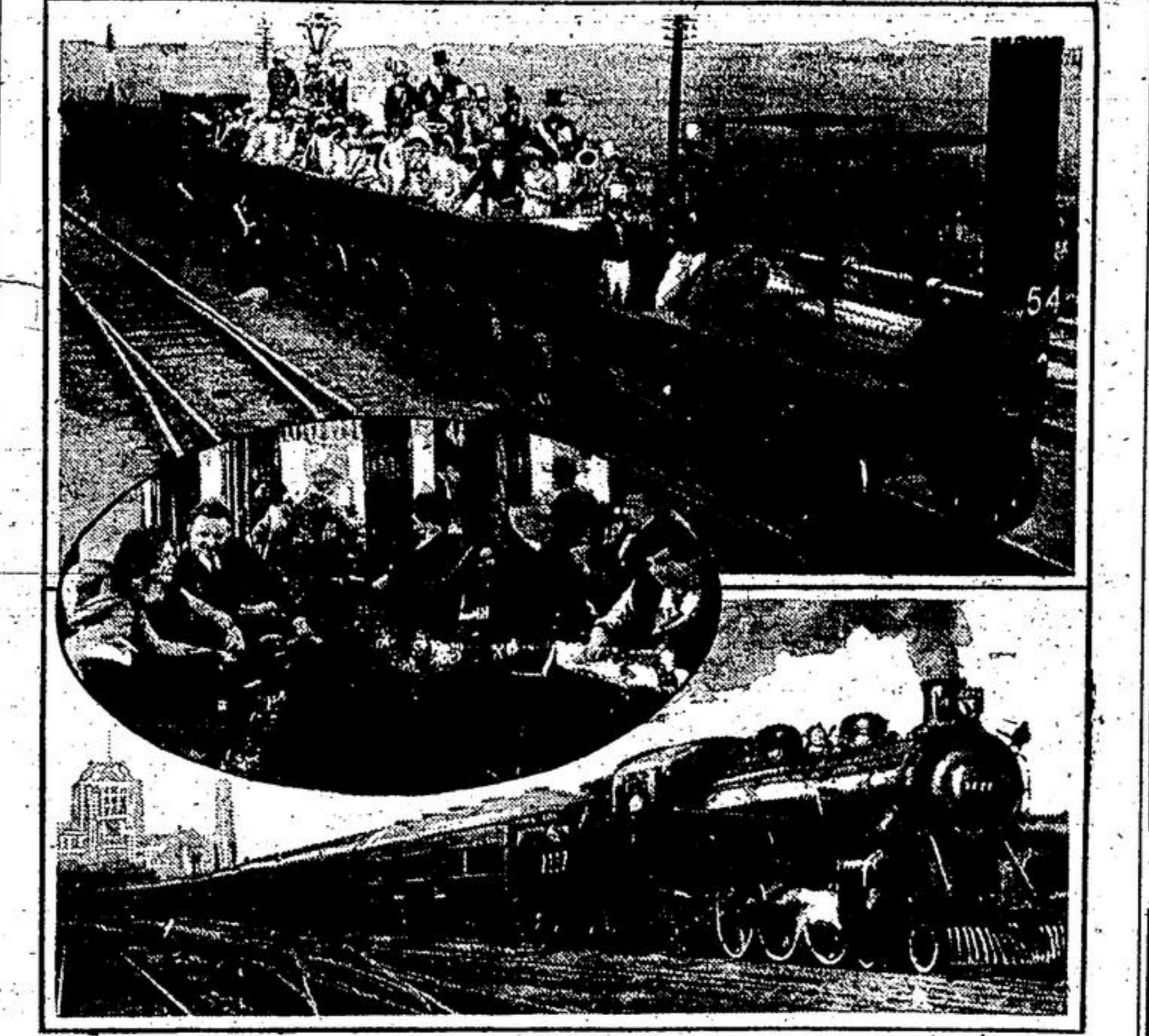

BRITAIN CELEBRATES HUNDRED YEARS OF RAILROADING

The old Stockton and Darlington Railway, in England, is a matter of history now. Its board of directors is no more; its inventor has passed to his reward; its rolling stock, or what survives of it, rests in peace in the museums—having served its day and been left behind in the march of progress.

But this year—a century since the time when the Stockton and Darlington Railway was regarded as a marvelous engineering achievement and

thoroughly infected with the spirit of the revolution. All those who took part in the processions, and some of those who didn't, dressed in the costumes of the period, saving in the celebration an atmosphere altogether in keeping with the nature of the celebration.

By way of showing the wonderful development that has taken place in railroading since the first engine puffed its way from Darlington to Stockton there is shown above one of the engines of the original train contrasted with the ultra-modern Trans-Canada, the all-steel Canadian Pacific Train, which nowadays conveys its passengers from one part of the Dominion to another three and a half miles away, at a speed considered unattainable by our forefathers, and

where roots are not available and for late winter feeding, dried beet pulp is well worth considering as a substitute for the product of the sugar-beet industry in available in considerable quantities in the late fall and early winter, and will be stored indefinitely provided it is kept dry. It should always be soaked before feeding, as it will take up about three times its own weight in water and swell accordingly. The addition of a little ferrous sulphate will improve the palatability of the feed. Experiments conducted in the Division of Animal Husbandry have shown that dried beet pulp gives its best and most economical results when used to replace the meal mixture or roots of a already well-balanced ration, rather than when it is substituted for any other succulent, such as silage, in the ration. Nevertheless, where silage is not available, dried beet pulp in quantities, four to five pounds dry weight daily, should yield profitable returns. Dried beet pulp should be stored in a clean, dry place, and should be put permanently to rest. Take no substitute.
