Sir Adam Beck Has Passed Away

Ontario's Hydro Knight Died a London on Saturday

Night · Sir Adam Beck, founder of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Systems and chairman of the Operating Commission since its establishment and for twenty-five years one of the mos forceful characters in the public life of London and the province and an internationally known apostle of municiple ownership, died Saturday evening at 10 o'clock at his residence,

For two weeks it had heen known that Sir Adam's brief reaction of strength derived from blood trans. fusions in the John Hopkins Hospital at Baltimore was ebbing from him and that pernicious anaemia with which he had been sticken in the autumn, had run-the inevitable course. The great respect and honor in which Sir Adam Beck was held was amply manifested at the large attendance at the funeral at London and at Hamilton on Tuesday.
