### GASOLINE TANK EXPLODES of the Big Clock Tower" will be read William Swanston Badly Injured When Examining Tank with Lighted

Match Suffering from a compound fracture of the left leg, sustained when a gasoline tunk which he was examining exploded. William Swanston, a wellknown farmer of Rockwood district, lies at the General Hospital, Guelph, in a critical condition. The accident occurred about cleven o'clock Wednes-

day morning of last week. Mr. Swanston had emptied a tank of gasoline, used on his farm on the third line of Eramosa Township for power purposes on Tuesday. Apparently a small quantity of the explosive. liquid had been left in the receptable which exploded when he lit a match Wednesday morning to look into the tank. When the receptacle burgt, the fragments of metal flew in every direction, several striking Mr. Swanston on the leg, causing a compound fracture. A friend, Mr. L. M. Loutie, of Toronto, who was standing close by when the explosion occurred, was uninjured, but narrowly escaped being struck by one of the flying particles which just grazed him.

A physician was immediately sum-
