in the fall gave an average increase in acre, the average value of which was \$34.15, over the plots which were spring ploughed; and as both the fall ploughfertilized alike, planted and harvested on the same days, and cultivated alike the time of ploughing was the

It was observed that plots which were ploughed in the fall retain the moisture for a much longer period of time the following summer than those which were spring ploughed. The experiments were made on medium sandy loam soil and while this

soil runs together somewhat in winter it is easily prepared for tobacco in the spring by disking it thoroughly. Fall ploughing is not alone of value in conserving the moisture and improving the mechanical condition; of the soil as ploughing after October first has proven very helpful in destroying the inrvae of the cutworm thus reducing the damage aften done by


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
