FLAX PROSPECTS ENCOUR-

The prospects of flax cultivation are promising. In his report of 1924 recently published by the Department of Agriculture at Ottawa, Mr. R. J. Hutchinson, Chief Officer of the Fibre division of the Experimental Farms, says that the year was the most encouraging for Canadian flax growers since 1920. The growing and retting conditions in Western Ontario, where practically all the Canadian fibre-flax is at present produced, were very favorable, with the result that an exceptionally high yield of fibre and seed were obtained. Some commercial areas produced as high as 389 pounds of fibre and .16 bushels of mill-run seed per acre. Not only were the yields of fibre and seed higher than usual, but the demand for them showed improvement. One grower in western Ontario was offered 30 cents per pound for one lot of fibre. Most of the seed was sold to the linseed oil mills at prices ranging from \$2.40 to \$2.65 per bushel.
