# The Benefits of Workmen's Compensation

The Workmen's Compensation Board for the Province of Ontario has just issued a statement showing that the Board awarded \$5,565,443.39 in benefits in 1925. This figure is noticeably lower than ber of accidents has been greater, amounting in 1925 to 60,012, as compared with 58,675 during 1924. One no table feature of the accident statistics, however, is the decrease in fatalities, the total number in 1925 being 345 which is considerably less than the figures for 1924 which were set at 402. This alone is a most important item to the whole Province. is evident from the figures issued by the Board that while minor accidents show an increase, probably due in part to better reporting, the serious and more costly types of accidents are on the down grade.

# BURNING

Many housewives have to use sunburned potatoes throughout the winter lar is frequently the cause. Potatoes may be injured by sunshine without actually showing sunburn on the surface. Often you can detect the slight greenish tinge just beneath the skin it. It may be seen at times as a disthat layer of green cells immediately

In the ordinary cellar potatoes are promptly done. kept in too much light. The housewife uses those from the top of the pile and thus exposes those beneath. which in turn are subjected to the unfavorable light rays. In that way it is easy to be using sunburned botatees constantly without realizing it. Potatoes that have been in a light aroom or in line with the sunlight shining through a cellar window for only a few days are seriously injured. They are heavy and soggy, dark colored, and not uniform in texture when cooked.

It is always advisable to keep the polato pile covered with gunny sacks, enavas or some such material if the cellar is at all light. It is still easier to tack gunny sucks over the win-

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
