HOW JESUS DEALS WITH SINNERS
General Lesson Title—Jesus and the
Samaritan Woman.

Scripture Lesson.—John 4: 1-42.
Golden Text.—With joy shall ye
draw water out of the wells of salva-
tion.—Jan. 12: 3.

Devotional Reading.—Phil. 3: 8-14.
The Text Explained
Having begun his public ministry
and finding that he was attracting
more people than John the Baptist,

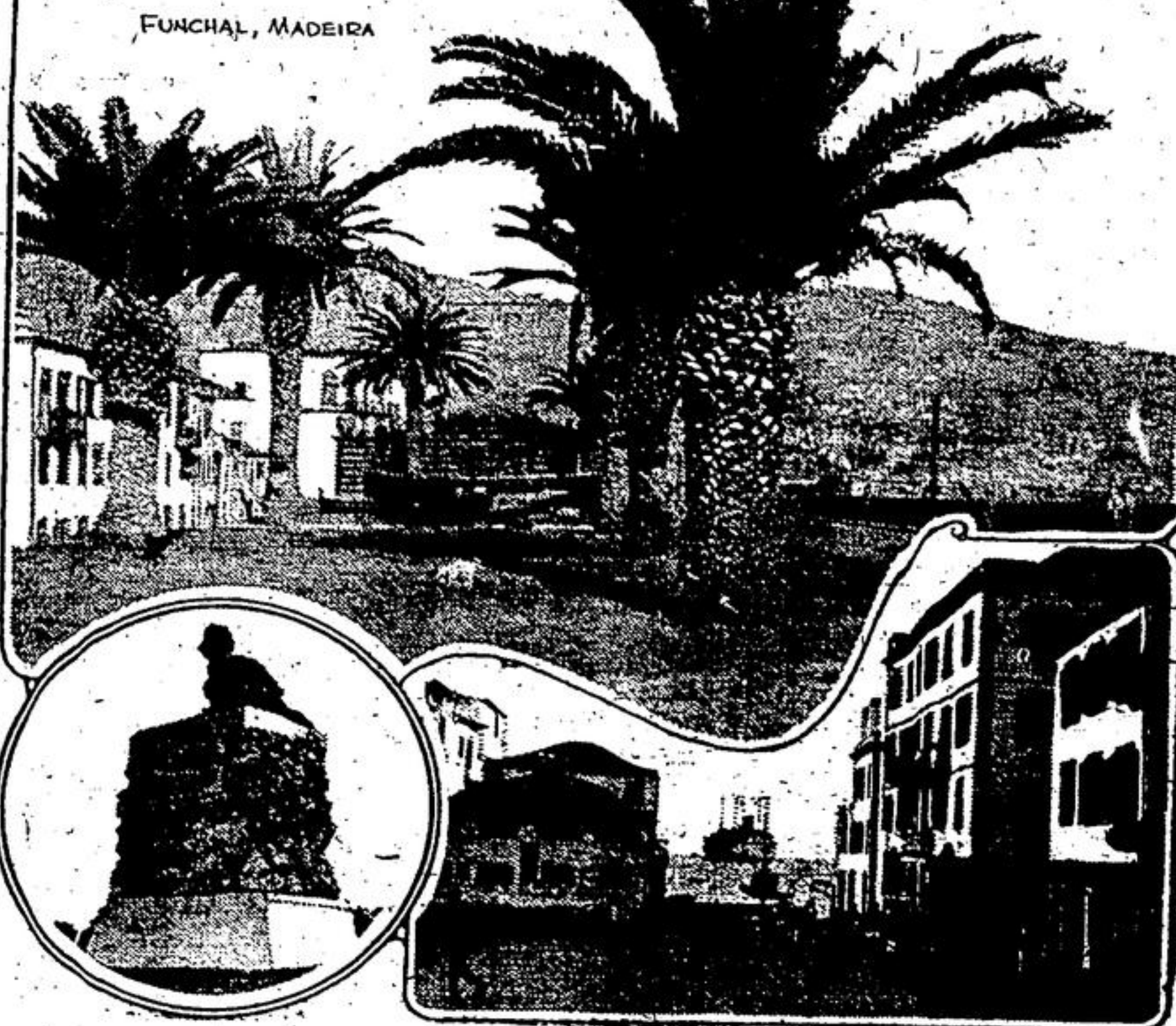
UP WITH THE TIMES

AT Funchal, first stop of the Cana-
dian Pacific line, "Empress of Scot-
land" on its Mediterranean cruise.

There are "dozens" of shops where this
embroidery is sold. The natives also
make intricately woven baskets and
reed furniture, but furniture is not
easy to carry round on a cruise, and
even baskets are somewhat cumbers-
ome, although there is scarcely any
suffering from lack of space in the
streets of Funchal, paved with small,
round, irregular stones laid in geometri-
cal designs, that the tourist usually
makes his purchases. Sometimes, if
luck is with you, you may be able to

buy an exquisite piece of handwork
from a pretty woman embroidering in
her fragrant garden. But if you are
a bachelor, remember the fate of Col-
umbus and beware the fair maids of
Madeira.

It is not necessary to set foot on the
soil of Madeira to buy the tempting
native products for hundreds of small
boats, with natives vociferously dis-
playing their wares, come danding
and out from the wharves and not so
far as in the shops along the narrow
quayside paved streets. Then too, it

chief means of transportation down
Funchal's big mountain, Terreiro da
Lueta.
